

It is with deep sadness that we remember Ms Winnie Yau Ping Wai (邱秉維老師) ('59), who peacefully passed away on 27 December 2024. Born on 26 April 1941, Ms Yau entered Ying Wa Girls' School in September 1953 at Primary 6 and completed Form 7 in 1961. After two

years of teacher training at Northcote Training College, she began her teaching career at Ying Wa, where she dedicated herself to education until her early retirement in 1996. Following her retirement, she emigrated to Canada, where she continued to embrace life fully.

Ms Yau was more than a teacher; she was a cherished mentor, advisor and friend to countless students. Her passion for Mathematics was matched only by her love for her students. Her classroom was a place of encouragement, laughter and growth.

Beyond academics, Ms Yau was actively involved in various school organizations, including the Christian Fellowship, Student Council and Inter-house Committee. She inspired students to embrace their potential and cultivate their leadership skills, emphasizing the importance of community and service.

After emigrating to Canada, Ms Yau continued to live life to the fullest, engaging in line-dancing and maintaining her vibrant spirit. Her joyful nature and unwavering faith touched everyone around her, leaving a lasting impact on the lives she encountered. She was also a key figure in establishing and running the Alumnae Association Chapter in Toronto, fostering connections among graduates and promoting a sense of community.

The funeral service for Ms Yau was held on 31 December 2024, at the Chapel Ridge Funeral Home, where family, friends and former students gathered to celebrate her remarkable life. Attendees reflected on the joy and wisdom she brought into their lives, sharing heartfelt memories and bittersweet laughter. Ms Yau's legacy as a cherished educator and her unwavering faith will continue to resonate within the Ying Wa community. Her involvement in the Alumnae Association Toronto Chapter fostered lasting connections among graduates, ensuring her spirit of camaraderie thrives.

Nevertheless, I cherished my time at Ying Wa and made lifelong friends. I also fondly remember lunch visits with my grandma, sometimes bringing dishes from Home Economics class.

It wasn't until my mom's funeral that I truly grasped her influence on my life. As I listened to tributes from her former colleagues, friends, and students, I realized how much she shaped me. Her passion for helping others and building communities was something I inherited. I dedicate time to volunteering for causes I support and working to build communities. My work ethic and commitment to service are values instilled by my parents, and I am proud to carry on their legacies.

I was fortunate to be blessed with parents who were remarkable individuals who dedicated their lives to making the world better. Their legacy lives on in the countless lives they touched. I am forever grateful for their guidance and the profound impact they had on my life.

When I rejoined Ying Wa in 1972 to serve as Principal, I met a young teacher who greeted me with a broad, cheerful smile. Her warm and friendly gestures soon dispelled my nervous uncertainty of settling in a totally new working environment. That was my first impression of Winnie.

Over the years, we worked closely as colleagues as well as friends. She was always resourceful and quick to find solutions to all kinds of problems, a great support to me as I gradually acquired experiences in dealing with administrative matters.

My sudden attack of Rheumatoid Arthritis (RA) in 1986 left me almost completely paralysed for two weeks. Many teachers immediately came to help by organising a committee to look after the daily running of the school, some offered medical advice, some rendered personal service. Winnie was one of those who took me to physiotherapy sessions. She even bought me clothing for RA patients. I was deeply touched by her thoughtfulness.

Winnie served Ying Wa with total dedication as a teacher and alumna. She was an efficient organiser/coordinator of Toronto Alumnae Association functions. Her annual visit to Hong Kong to attend Ying Wa's Founder's Day service was a sound evidence of being "身遠心莫離". She made use of any available chances to raise funds for her alma mater, e.g. by donating all her 70th birthday monetary gifts to Ying Wa's Redevelopment Fund.

Her unfaltering faith in God was an inspiration to her students and friends. She played an active role in her church and 105 Gibson Centre in Toronto, and was most eager to raise funds for them whenever possible.

When I visited Winnie and her husband at their home in January 2023, both of them seemed to be in reasonably good health. It was shocking to know that her heart ailment turned out to be leukemia in November that year, and Wilson's sudden demise in January the following year was another sad blow. Winnie's courage and ready acceptance of these "disasters" were truly admirable.

Winnie's passing is a sad loss to us, yet we give thanks to God for her life and works, and her loving generosity to her family and friends. She will always be fondly remembered.

Your hopefulness, even after Mr. Cheung's passing a few months earlier, reflected a strength anchored in God. You have truly been a living example of Christ's love.

Thank you for being an extraordinary teacher, a mentor and an advisor. Your influence has shaped my journey in ways I will forever cherish.


COVID-19

Zoom was a novelty at the time, and we were just relieved when the meeting successfully finished.

Soon after, Ms Yau let us, the committee, know that her 80th birthday was coming up in April. She had this ritual of celebrating her significant birthdays when she turned 50, 60 and 70. She would like a Zoom meeting with her family and friends to celebrate her 80th birthday. Easy job, we readily nodded, not knowing what we would be getting into.

We thought it would just be another Zoom meeting: setting up the link and password. After a couple of meetings, we started to realize the magnitude and complexity of work involved. We were literally in a boot camp, busily attending crash courses on Zoom technology.

There would be 10 groups of attendees: the Yau family, the Cheung family, friends from school, colleagues from teaching, friends from Hop Yat Church.....

She divided her life into 4 phases: childhood, student, teacher, and retirement. She wanted to have a photo album set up reflecting these phases with her narrating on the side. When she showed us her picture albums, we were bewildered: hundreds of hardcopy pictures. After many rounds of meetings, she agreed to reduce the number of pictures to a manageable size and these pictures were scanned and arranged accordingly.



There would be video clips: her granddaughters playing a piano recital, her son and daughter-in-law singing a duet, her friends and colleagues saying a few words....

There would be live interviews with Mr Wilson Cheung (Ms Yau's husband), Ms Barr in Shanghai, and Rev CC Lee in Hong Kong...

Ms Yau and Rev Lee had the same birthdays. Therefore, both Ms Yau and Rev Lee would like to be in the spotlight, celebrating their birthdays live on screen.

Ms Yau would like to meet all guests and have a picture taken with each group at the end of the meeting. One of us would escort her from one breakout room to the next to do PrintScreen.

We were overwhelmed by the number of 'fans' who wanted to JUST say a few words. In the end, we had to put in a time limit; otherwise, the meeting would never end.

The pot we used was not large enough, so when the herbs and water were boiling, they spilled over and made a mess. From then onwards, I would prepare the medicine at home with a stockpot, and bring it over to you. Even when your health started to deteriorate, and you were losing your appetite, you still tried your best to finish the food prepared for you. I really admire your virtue of not wasting food.

You were super excited when we, Class of '71, arranged a gathering for our reunion at Amica's function room on July 24. As usual, you were dressed smartly in colour coordinated white T-shirt with a light blue jacket. You also had your hair styled at the in-house salon. We spent a joyous afternoon together. There was a total of 19 participants at this event, including you, Miss Lily Chow, and local and overseas alumnae from the 1960s joining us.

Till we meet again

I last visited you in the morning of December 24, but unfortunately, you were asleep. I did not want to disturb you and left shortly. I planned to visit you again on December 27. However, when I switched on my phone that morning, I saw the sad news that you had just passed away. I was sad at first, but then I knew where you had gone and you would be enjoying your new life with your Lord.

I told you once that you were God's reply to my prayer as I was uncertain about my future before my retirement in March 2024 – my new assignment is you. Miss Yau, a temporary farewell to you until we meet again in the Lord's home. I am honoured to have this opportunity to accompany you throughout 2024.
